It was invented by William Keast, a Practical Miner of many years' experience, who worked in the above Mine 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ years. The Model took nearly 5 years to construct, and consists of real gold quartz and mineral. It is the same Model that was exhibited at the World's Fair, Chicago, 1893, and at the Mid-Winter Fair, San Francisco, California, 1894, receiving the highest award, a Gold Medal, for its merits.
