

THE NATIONAL BAND FESTIVAL

By JOHN HENRY ILES

VER 5,000 musicians, belonging to 208 brass bands, will be heard by an audience expected to number over 60,000 at the National Band Festival to-day. This year's entries constitute a new high record.

The instruments alone used in this mammoth musical event are worth £250,000. The uniforms worn by the bandsmen are valued at another £50,000 at least.

Four countries will be represented, viz.:—England, Scotland, Wales and Canada.

The keenness in these annual National Band Contests is growing enormously, helped by the ever-increasing recognition of the musical skill and ability of our working-men bandsmen leading to many public engagements and B.B.C. bookings.

Thirty-six English Counties are represented, Yorkshire taking top place with twenty-five bands. Durham follows with twenty and London is third with fifteen; the runners-up are Lancs. twelve bands; Kent nine; Sussex eight; Warwick and Northants seven each; Essex and Cambs. six each; Notts., Northumberland, Cornwall, Herts., Staffs., Gloucester and Wilts. five each; Lincs., Hants. and Somerset four each; Derby, Surrey, Middlesex, Norfolk and Devon three each; Cheshire, Beds., Cumberland, Oxford, Dorset, Bucks., Leicester and Shropshire two each; Flintshire, Berks. and Hunts. one each.

The following is reprinted from the "Newcastle Sunday Sun" by courteous permission of the Editor:—
"Competitors in this annual battle of the bands come from all parts of the British Isles, and, as usual, the bandsmen of the North-East of England again are making a strong bid for honours.

FORTY YEARS AGO

"Brass bands are now to be seen everywhere. They are part and parcel of the nation's musical life. You may find it difficult, therefore, to visualise the entirely different position thirty-five or forty years ago. At that time it was quite rare to meet anyone in the South of England who even knew what a North of England brass band was, much less

had seen or heard one.
"Happening to be in Manchester in September, 1898, I was asked to go to the Belle Vue band contest. To be candid, I

immediately thought of German street bands!

"Frankly, I was thoroughly amazed. It was a complete revelation to me. Was it really possible, I kept asking myself that the fine bands I heard were composed exclusively

of working men musicians

Inspired by what I had heard I returned to London with a clear-cut vision at the back of my mind. I resolved to make the wonderful musical achievements of these North pitmen and other comparatively poor men, known to the whole world, and from those humble beginnings to widen the scope of the brass band movement until its benefits could be enjoyed by other working men musicians all over the country

"After nearly forty years unremitting labour to attain that

end I think I can claim modestly to have succeeded.

BAND HISTORY MADE

" Back again in London I got into touch with Mr. Samuel Cope, one of the 'grand old men' of the brass band world I bought The British Bandsman, a periodical then published monthly, but devoted mostly to military bands.

Later, I purchased the business of Richard Smith & Co., the oldest established brass band music publishing firm in

Great Britain.

"I was fortunate in gaining the valuable sympathy of the late Lord Northcliffe in my object, and as a result, the 'Absent Minded Beggar' Concert at the Royal Albert Hall was arranged. The idea was to demonstrate what brass bands could do, and also to help the 'Absent Minded Beggar' Fund, which was for the benefit of relatives of soldiers in the Boer War.

" For this spectacular event, many provincial prize bands came to London, and, massed under the baton of the late Sir Arthur Sullivan, played the show pieces then current. Between £2,000 and £3,000 was raised for the Fund at this historic concert—a remarkable achievement in those days.

Sir Arthur Sullivan happened to be a director of the Crystal Palace. That was obviously the place for a national

band competition.

A FAMOUS TROPHY

" First, it was essential to convince North brass musicians generally that I was in earnest, and that a London festival was practicable. The second necessity was to interest the

"Sir Arthur Sullivan and I decided that the champion band should be offered a trophy far and away better than anything previously awarded. The outcome was the now

world-famous 'Thousand Guineas Trophy.

"This magnificent trophy, to capture which is to-day the greatest ambition of every brass band in the world, is an almost awe-inspiring specimen of the jeweller's art. only is it of immense size, but it is encrusted lavishly with genuine precious stones.

"This trophy was publicly exhibited throughout the North, especially in the districts where the principal bands came from. We organised numerous beflagged processions through the various towns. These were heralded by bands playing, and the much-admired trophy was displayed

resplendent upon a gaily decorated trolley.
"The first festival was held in 1900. Only twenty-nine bands entered. This year there are nearly eight times that

number of entries.

TOUR OF THE CHAMPIONS

"Right from the start, the festival was an unqualified success. Interest in brass bands grew apace. Hundreds of new bands were formed. I arranged tours of the champion bands and thus helped to develop general interest in brass The champions toured largely in the South and West of England, going even as far as Cornwall.

As early as 1904, the late King Edward graciously gave his valuable patronage to a tour of the famous Besses O' Th' The proceeds of the tour were handed Barn Band in France. The proceeds of the tour were handed over to French charities, but the benefit to us was the enormous publicity focussed in consequence upon British

brass band developments.

How far afield interest in this gigantic festival soon spread will be realised when I tell you that an Australian band has on two occasions journeyed all the way from "down under" to compete at the Crystal Palace.

FAMILY ENTHUSIASM

" It is safe to prophesy that brass bands will continue to They bring the opportunity to express beauty in sound to thousands of working men who otherwise would be denied that joy. Britain's brass bands have been built up with no trace of professionalism, and therein lies their chief strength, for the bandsmen are united solely by a sheer love of

This makes the art of the brass bandsman pre-eminently a family affair. It brings the delight of music-making right into the humblest home. Many boys in the North and in Wales and Scotland of only eight or nine years of age, are quite brilliant players. They have just picked up the instrument of their father or uncle—and begun to play. Any of the

older players will give them a lesson.

"Now, after thirty-five years that I have personally conducted the massed bands on this day of days, I still feel that same infectious thrill at the National Band Festival. Where else can you witness a harmony of intention so perfect? Where else can you see so many working men, pitmen, artisans and railwaymen all united in a single endeavour?

Arthur Bliss and "Kenilworth"

ORN in 1891, a Londoner, Arthur Bliss, from earliest childhood, spent his years in a musical atmosphere. His mother was an accomplished pianist, and each of his three brothers played instruments. He was educated at Rugby and Cambridge, but just when his musical career as a composer was starting the war broke out. Arthur Bliss served in France from 1915 to 1918 with the Royal Fusiliers and later with the Grenadier Guards. He was wounded at the battle of the Somme, gassed in the last few months at Cambria, and mentioned in despatches for gallantry.

In the years following the war he seized the attention of the musical world by writing music of daring originality, notably the "Colour" Symphony, in which each movement depicts a different colour and associations.

In 1923 he left for America and spent two years in California, investigating among other things the relation of music to the films, and meeting Douglas Fairbanks, Charlie Chaplin and other well-known figures in Hollywood.

Soon after his return to England he wrote "Morning Heroes," a symphony on the subject of war, for orator, chorus and orchestra. His music is always free from convention and bears a high voltage, the most recent evidence of which is in his incidental music to the H. G. Wells' film, "Things to Come," which has made his music known to a further wide audience.

His test piece, "Kenilworth," written for brass bands, is the latest music from his pen. He tells how the subject came to him in the following words:—

"When Mr. Iles suggested that I should write the test piece for this year's great Brass Band Festival, I was naturally very pleased at the compliment, and at once determined to find a subject that suited the brilliance of tone and was worthy of the magnificent technique of brass band players. I have always thought that the true home of brass bands is in the open air, where their power of conveying ceremony and pageantry, brilliant or solemn, is most finely felt.

"Many different subjects occurred to me, and I was wondering which to choose, when a sudden chance decided me.

"I was motoring back from Birmingham with my wife, after conducting a concert there, and our route lay near Kenilworth. As neither of us had ever seen this historic place we stopped there for lunch, and later strolled over the Castle grounds. It was a lovely autumn day, and the place was deserted except for ourselves. As we wandered from tower to dungeon, through the superb banqueting hall, along the ancient tilt yard, we began to reconstruct the ruins in our imagination and visualise all the drama, the romance, the exciting scenes of revelry and battle that these old walls had seen. I decided then and there to write a work called 'Kenilworth.' I read all about the Castle that I could, and chose the special occasion in 1575, described by Sir Walter Scott, when Queen Elizabeth visited the Earl of Leicester there.

"Imagine the scenes of splendour!

"First the arrival of the Queen at the gates of the Castle, mounted on a white horse, riding through lines of cheering citizens. At her right hand rides the Earl of Leicester, magnificently equipped. At the gates the keeper of the Castle challenges the right of anyone to enter, but on learning that it is the Queen of England herself who demands admission he drops on one knee, and with deep homage hands her the key of the fortress gates. After a brief speech of thanks, the Queen rides into the Castle grounds.

Here a special lake has been constructed and on a floating island the Spirit of the Lake, surrounded by attendants, appears. After an acted play of welcome, she delivers the Castle into the Queen's hands and sinks beneath the waters. The Queen stays nineteen days, during which time continuous entertainment, joustings, sports, dancing are offered to please her. To show that the visit is given up to pleasure, the clock in the banqueting hall stands always at the hour of dining.

"The first section of my work describes the arrival of the Queen at the Castle gates and the ceremony of the keys. The second section describes the welcoming serenade from the lake—and in the third and longest section the rousing enthusiasm for the presence of the Queen is portrayed in a joyous march.

I have dedicated this composition to Mr. Kenneth Wright, who is well known to all brass band players.

"I have no doubt that the bands will understand what is in my mind and will interpret it with the utmost brilliance. My admiration for their playing is great, and I look forward to September 26th with the utmost eagerness."





Art Treasures of the Crystal Palace

THE Crystal Palace possesses what is probably the finest collection of art exhibits in the world. Over the long period of years dating from their acquisition and terminating when the Admiralty vacated the building after the Great War most of these suffered from damage, deterioration and obscurity, but since then the work of restoration has been proceeded with carefully and unremittingly with the result that they are now exposed in their original beauty and impressiveness.

Visitors to the Crystal Palace should not fail to examine these treasures—relics and replicas of the sculptural and architectural masterpieces of the ages—and they will find much to interest; reviving memories of mythological and historical incidents heard from time to time, and gleaning impressions for the visualisation of others to be heard in the future. Many familiar names will be seen on the pedestals carrying the mind from legend to fact, from earliest history to the present century and from rural life to the turmoil of a city.

As a guide to the visitor, we give below a brief reference to some of the most outstanding features:

THE STATUARY. The Crystal Palace collection of statuary is probably unparalleled, and in some cases it has the only remaining examples of priceless works of art the originals of which have been lost in wars, fires and other calamities.

THE POMPEIAN COURT.

This architectural depicts a typical residence in the ancient city of Pompeii. The mural decoration and mosaic paving illustrate the ornate artistry of ancient Italy, and if the colouration seems to us somewhat vivid, it must be remembered that Pompeii was situated in a hot climate where residences were necessarily shaded and interiors toned by the consequent darkness. The intricate detail of the mural decoration is worthy of the closest inspection, and it will be noted that this is even carried to the extent of light and shade effects in each subject.

THE EGYPTIAN COURT. Composed of replicas of works in various Egyptian Temples from the Theban to the Ptolemaic period, this Court affords an excellent epitome of the architecture of ancient Egypt. A cast of the famous Rosetta Stone will be seen in this enclosure.

THE GREEK COURT. The architecture of this Court is mainly modelled on that of the Temple of Jupiter at Memea, about 400 B.C. In the centre of the Court, which represents part of a Greek agora, or forum, used as a market place, will be found the famous Laocoon, depicting a father and his two sons in the toils of pythons, which has been declared by artists and critics to be the most remarkable statuary group of that period.

THE ROMAN COURT. That it depicts a period of over-ornamentation will be the impression on entering this Court; nevertheless, it will be acknowledged that there is much to admire, both in the architecture and the decoration. The three vestibules each have a chef d'œuvre of universal fame as its principal feature: the first, Venus Victorius; the second, the Apollo Belvedere; and the third, Diana with the Deer.

THE ALHAMBRA COURT. The beautiful arabesque work on the walls of this Court which, whilst religiously excluding animal forms, consists of inscriptions intertwined with imaginary foliage, stalks, plants and geometric figures, will deeply appeal to the lover of line and decorative art. The marvellous stalactite roof of the Hall of Abencerrages is worthy of inspection. This Court, as a whole, is representagive of the architecture of the Moorish Kingdom of Granada in the thirteenth century.

THE BYZANTINE COURT. This and the other Courts on the Eastern side of the North Nave are representations rather than expositions, as they consist of collections of works typical of the period they portray. The Byzantine period may be roughly said to have extended from the sixth to the eleventh centuries, and this Court contains many representations of early Christian art.

THE GERMAN MEDIÆVAL COURT. This small Court is devoted exclusively to examples of Gothic Art and Architecture in Germany. The large doorway in the centre is cast from a celebrated model at Nuremburg.

THE ENGLISH MEDIÆVAL COURT. Court represents the best and brightest period of English Gothic architecture. It contains many items of interest, the most noticeable of which are the arches and columns modelled from the Abbey of Guisborough, Yorkshire, and the magnificent doorway from Rochester Cathedral.

THE FRENCH AND ITALIAN MEDIÆVAL COURT.

The grand range of arches in this Court are from the choir of Notre Dame. They are good examples of thirteenth century architecture, the natural foliage and symbolic monsters being of exceptional exceilence. The principal feature of this Court is the famous ironwork door from the West front of Notre Dame.

THE RENAISSANCE COURT Many beautiful works of art are included in this Court, and special attention is invited to the wonderful bronze gates designed and executed by Lorenzo Ghiberti between the years 1420 and 1450. They form one of the three entrances to the Baptistery of the Cathedral of Florence, and represent the principal subjects of the Old Testament, from the Creation to the building of the Temple by Solomon.
