Tribute to Mr. J. R. Markham at Social Gathering.

Representatives of all the local bands which took part in the recent Brass Band Festival at Leicester the other week, were present at a social and musical evening held on March 19th at the Prince Albert Hotel, Upper Conduit Street (states the "Leicester Mail").

Mr. J. R. Markham, the Hon. Secretary presided over the gathering and was supported by Councillor F. A. Toone, Councillor W. K. Billings, Alderman W. J. Lovell, Councillor W. J. Sheppard, Councillor F. M. Moore, Mr. E. Fox, Mr. A. Lawton, Mr. Baxter (President of the Ibstock Band), Mr. Beresford (the Band Master of the Morris Motor Works Band), Mr. and Mrs. Horace Wright, Mr. W. Markham, Mr. J. E. Spurway, Mr. J. Chapman, and others.

The Chairman read a telegram which he had received from Messrs. Wright and Round, of Liverpool, music publishers, extending congratulations to the organisation, whilst Councillor G. E. Hilton, the Musical Director of the City Parks Committee and Lieut. J. Ord Hume, London, sent apologies for absence. Councillor F. A. Toone, the President of the Band Festival, in proposing a vote of thanks to Mr. Markham, the Secretary, said that whatever success the Festival obtained in the future, whether in their time or not, history would tell them that it was originated by Mr. Markham. They ought to feel proud that they had someone taking such a deep interest in the Festival like the one just held. Organisation makes success, and Mr. Markham's efforts have made it the best ever held in the city. Crystal Palace would take its place in the Band World. He appealed to patrons to support the event; not only for its own sake, but for the sake of the city. He announced that the sum of £74.2s. 3d. would be handed over to the Royal Infirmary as a result of the effort.

Councillor W. K. Billings seconded the proposition, and also spoke highly of Mr. Markham's work. Alderman W. J. Lovell said he wished Mr. Markham every success in his efforts to popularise band music. He had initiated the Festival and he was keeping it going. Councillor Sheppard and Councillor Moore spoke with good feeling to the Hon. Secretary of the Festival.

In a suitable reply Mr. Markham mentioned that 27 bands had been crowded out at the last contest, and several of these had already offered to pay their entrance fee for next year so as to be sure of participating then. He said he loved the bands which came, some of them a great many miles, to help him in his efforts for the love of music in this city, and also to help the Royal Infirmary. Mr. Markham related his experience in going to Long Eaton to present the "Leicester Mail" Challenge Cup and the "Leicester Mercury" Challenge Cup which he presented down the mines.

After his speech Mr. Markham received a great ovation. The President, Councillor F. A. Toone, rose and said, "We all admire our Secretary for his self-sacrifice which he has made to help the cause. I will try to satisfy his mind so he can have a night's sleep to-night. I will make up the amount in round figurees." (Applause.)

Wright and Rounds Liverpool Brass Band News says: Mr. J. R. Markham has been elected a Life Governor of the Leicester Royal Infirmary, by the unanimous vote of over 200 Governors and subscribers, at their 153rd annual meeting. Mr. Markham has raised over £200 for the Infirmary. At a recent meeting of the X-rays Department after reconstruction he had the pleasure of handing the treasurer £100 as the proceeds of the 1926 Festival, and he hopes to raise even more in 1927. At any rate Mr. Markham has the cause of bands and Infirmary in his heart, and he is a "trier" for both all the time.


